The festival's new media partner, the Czech News Agency (CTK), reported almost daily on the latest events. In cooperation with CzechTourism and

the Czech Centres, we welcomed journalists from across the globe, and the festival received extensive coverage in Japanese, Korean, Taiwanese, Brazilian, Indian, German, British, Irish, Italian, Spanish, Serbian, Slovak, and Polish media. We also owe a great debt of gratitude to Czech journalists, who throughout the year have brought unique interviews and articles about the Prague Spring 2025 to lovers of classical music, and whose concert reviews will remain a lasting record of the jubilee 80th edition for generations to come.

To all of you who contributed to this year's festival, I wish to express my heartfelt thanks and my hope that you will remain loyal to the Prague Spring in the years ahead, for it is a festival that is truly unique – and I dare say, the only one of its kind in the Czech Republic.

A RECORD-BREAKING FESTIVAL IN NUMBERS

The 80^{th} anniversary edition of the Prague Spring International Music Festival and the 76^{th} Prague Spring International Music Competition brought a total of 80 events, including 46 concerts featuring more than 100 soloists, ensembles, and orchestras from 24 countries around the world. These attracted some 30,000 audience members and generated record takings of CZK 36.2 million, exceeding last year's record by CZK 11 million. Attendance reached 95%, with 34 festival events sold out completely, including all the major symphonic concerts. The festival welcomed 8 foreign orchestras and presented 10 world premieres.

The 76^{th} edition of the Prague Spring International Music Competition also broke records, with an all-time high of 458 young musicians from 47 countries applying. In total, 87 musicians from 29 countries came to Prague to compete in the oboe and cello categories.

218,000 users. On social media – Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube – posts reached 1.3 million users and generated 5.6 million media views. More than 2,000 articles and news reports on Prague Spring achieved a total estimated reach of approximately 194 million, with an advertising value equivalency (AVE) of over CZK 1,660,000,000. One concert broadcast, 25 episodes of Prague Spring Echoes, and the official festival trailer were seen on Czech Television by over 3,493,300 viewers. Czech Radio broadcast 4 concerts live. All broadcasts were made available to dozens of other radio stations via the EBU broadcasting network.

Cooperation with partners is reflected in a range of accompanying and presentation activities that reinforce the links between culture and business while reaching out to the festival's audiences. These formats allow partners to gain visibility, foster contacts, and actively engage in the festival's life.

In 2025, collaboration deepened with a number of foreign diplomatic missions in the Czech Republic, which contributed significantly to the international character of the festival. Together with the embassies of the **Republic of Korea**, **Japan**, **France**, **Switzerland**, **Estonia**, **Latvia**, **the United States of America**, and **the United Kingdom**, we were able to organise not only artistic performances by top interpreters but also social and networking events.

In 2025, Prague Spring continued its previous collaborations with institutions such as the National Theatre, the National Gallery Prague, the National Technical Museum, the DOX Centre for Contemporary Art, the Austrian Cultural Forum, the French Institute, Czech Centres, Czech Tourism and the Czech-German Fund for the Future. A JOURNEY TO THE GOTHENBURG SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

From 18 to 21 March, the Prague Spring Patron's Club visited Gothenburg, Sweden – a city connected with the work of Bedřich Smetana and home to the world-renowned Gothenburg Symphony Orchestra, which this year performed at the Prague Spring Festival for the first time.



The programme included an exclusive opportunity to attend the orchestra's dress rehearsal and evening concert in their architecturally unique concert hall dating from 1935. Under the baton of Anna Rakitina, the performance featured Poulenc's *Concerto for Two Pianos and Orchestra*, interpreted by Arthur and Lucas Jussen.

Musicologist Anders Carlsson introduced participants to Smetana's legacy in the city, including a visit to places where the composer lived and performed. In conclusion, the patrons experienced a remarkable performance of Britten's opera *Peter Grimes* at the modern Gothenburg Opera House, beautifully situated on the shores of the Kattegat Bay.
